



## **Equal Opportunities Policy**

### **1 Aims and objectives**

- 1.1 We do not discriminate against anyone, be they staff or pupil, on the grounds of their sex, race, colour, religion, nationality, ethnic or national origins. This is in line with the 1976 Race Relations Act and covers both direct and indirect discrimination.**
- 1.2 We promote the principles of fairness and justice for all through the education that we provide in our school.**
- 1.3 We ensure that all pupils have equal access to the full range of educational opportunities provided by the school.**
- 1.4 We constantly strive to remove any forms of indirect discrimination that may form barriers to learning.**
- 1.5 We ensure that all recruitment, employment, promotion and training systems are fair to all, and provide opportunities for everyone to achieve.**
- 1.6 We challenge stereotyping and prejudice whenever it occurs.**
- 1.7 We celebrate the cultural diversity of our community and show respect for all minority groups.**
- 1.8 We are aware that prejudice and stereotyping is caused by low self-image and ignorance. Through positive educational experiences and support for each individual's point of view, we aim to promote positive social attitudes and respect for all.**

### **2 Racism and Xenophobia**

- 2.1 It is the right of all pupils to receive the best education the school can provide, with access to all educational activities organised by the school. We do not tolerate any forms of racism or racist behaviour. Should a racist incident occur, we will act immediately to prevent any repetition of the incident. Nor will we tolerate the language of racism in any way, other than when used to teach children about inappropriate or offensive terms that are unacceptable (and the reasons for this).**
- 2.2 We endeavour to make our school welcoming to all minority groups. So, for example, we will immediately remove any offensive graffiti that we may find in school. We promote an understanding of different cultures through the topics studied by the children, and we reflect this in the displays of work shown around the school.**
- 2.3 Our curriculum reflects the attitudes, values and respect that we have for minority ethnic groups. So, for example, the history curriculum gives due emphasis to ancient African traditions and cultures in the work that the children do on the Ancient Egyptians. In the religious education**

curriculum topic on religious festivals, the children study the importance of Diwali to Hindus and Sikhs.

- 2.4 We will not tolerate any language that denigrates a race or ethnic identity or which aligns a race or ethnic identity with stereotypical behaviours, appearance, dress or actions. We will celebrate ethnic and racial diversity in all its forms at every stage of the school from EYFS to KS2.
- 2.4 Should anyone at our school be a victim of racism, we will do all we can to support that person in overcoming any difficulties they may have.

### **3 Sexism and Misogyny**

- 3.1 It is the right of all pupils to receive the best education the school can provide, with access for all genders to all educational activities organised by the school. We do not tolerate any forms of sexism or sexist behaviour. Should a sexist incident occur, we will act immediately to prevent any repetition of the incident. Nor will we tolerate the language of sexism in any way, other than when used to teach children about inappropriate or offensive terms that are unacceptable (and the reasons for this).
- 3.2 We believe that children of any gender have equal rights to the curriculum and will not act to reinforce a gender stereotype or minimise a child's capacity to express their own gender or their ideas about their own gender.
- 3.3 We aim to celebrate the successes and achievements of children from any gender, including children who exhibit to express multi-gender views or physicality. We will share the success of famous or historic individuals of any gender who offer children a role model for positive behaviour.
- 3.4 We will not tolerate any language that denigrates a particular gender or that aligns a gender or genders with stereotypical behaviours, appearance, dress or actions. We will celebrate gender diversity in all its forms at every stage of the school from EYFS to KS2.
- 3.5 We expect all staff, parents and other stake holders to join us in celebrating gender diversity and minimising negative stereotyping over gender. We make no connections between gendered behaviour and any given sexuality in either a positive or negative manner.
- 3.6 Should anyone at our school be a victim of sexism, we will do all we can to support that person in overcoming any difficulties they may have.

### **4 Homophobia and LGBTQ Rights**

- 4.1 It is the right of all pupils to receive the best education the school can provide, with access for all genders to all educational activities organised by the school. We do not tolerate any forms of homophobia or the denigration of LGBTQ children, parents or other individuals. Should a homophobic incident occur, we will act immediately to prevent any repetition of the incident. Nor will we tolerate the language of homophobia in any way, other than when used to teach children about inappropriate or offensive terms that are unacceptable (and the reasons for this).

- 4.2 **We believe that children of any sexuality or sexual identity or from a family with a particular sexual identity have equal rights to the curriculum and equivalent treatment in school. We will not act to diminish the access to the curriculum or school life for any child or family with any sexual identity.**
- 4.3 **We aim to celebrate the successes of children and figures from all sexual identities and will include work in our curriculum to recognise the positive role that LGBTQ people play and have played in society.**
- 4.4 **We will not tolerate any language that denigrates a particular sexual identity or which aligns a sexual identity with stereotypical behaviours, appearance, dress or actions. We will celebrate gender diversity in all its forms at every stage of the school from EYFS to KS2.**
- 4.5 **We expect all staff, parents and other stake holders to join us in celebrating diversity or sexual identity where appropriate and minimising negative stereotyping over sexual identity. We make no connections between personal behaviour and any given sexuality in either a positive or negative manner.**
- 4.6 **Should anyone at our school be a victim of discrimination on the basis of their sexual identity (child or adult), we will do all we can to support that person in overcoming any difficulties they may have.**

## **5 The role of governors**

- 5.1 **The governing body has set out its commitment to equal opportunities in this policy statement, and it will continue to do all it can to ensure that all members of the school community are treated fairly and with equality.**
- 5.2 **The governing body seeks to ensure that people with disabilities are not discriminated against when applying for jobs at our school. The governors take all reasonable steps to ensure that the school environment gives access to people with disabilities.**
- 5.3 **The governing body will, in its annual report, make reference to arrangements for disabled pupils.**
- 5.4 **The governors welcome all applications to join the school, whatever background or disability a child may have.**
- 5.5 **The governing body ensures that no child is discriminated against whilst in our school on account of their sex, religion or race. So, for example, all children have access to the full range of the curriculum, and regulations regarding school uniform will be applied equally to boys and girls. If a child's religion affects the school uniform, then the school will deal with each case sensitively and with respect for the child's cultural traditions.**

## **6 The role of the headteacher**

- 6.1 **It is the headteacher's role to implement the school's equal opportunities and anti-racist policy and s/he is supported by the governing body in so doing.**

- 6.2 **It is the headteacher's role to ensure that all staff are aware of the school policy on equal opportunities, and that teachers apply these guidelines fairly in all situations.**
- 6.3 **The headteacher ensures that all appointments panels give due regard to this policy, so that no-one is discriminated against when it comes to employment or training opportunities.**
- 6.4 **The headteacher promotes the principle of equal opportunity when developing the curriculum, and promotes respect for other people in all aspects of school life, for example, in the assembly, where respect for other people is a regular theme, and in displays shown around the school.**
- 6.5 **The headteacher treats all incidents of unfair treatment and any racist incidents with due seriousness.**
- 7 The role of the class teacher**
- 7.1 **The class teacher ensures that all pupils are treated fairly, equally and with respect. We do not discriminate against any child.**
- 7.2 **When selecting classroom material, teachers pay due regard to the sensitivities of all members of the class and do not provide material that is racist or sexist in nature. Teachers strive to provide material that gives positive images of ethnic minorities and that challenges stereotypical images of minority groups.**
- 7.3 **When designing schemes of work, we use this policy to guide us, both in our choice of topics to study, and in how to approach sensitive issues. So, for example, history topics in our school include examples of the significant contributions women have made to developments in this country's history. In geography topics the teacher attempts to counter stereotypical images of Africa and Asia and to show the true diversity of development in different parts of the world.**
- 7.4 **All our teachers challenge any incidents of prejudice or racism. We record any serious incidents in the school log book, and draw them to the attention of the headteacher. Teachers support the work of ancillary or support staff and encourage them to intervene in a positive way against any occurrence of discrimination.**
- 8 Monitoring and review**
- 8.1 **It is the responsibility of our governing body to monitor the effectiveness of this Equal Opportunities policy. The governing body does this by:**
- **monitoring the progress of pupils of minority groups and comparing it to the progress made by other pupils in the school;**
  - **monitoring the staff appointment process, so that no-one applying for a post at this school is discriminated against;**
  - **requiring the headteacher to report to governors on an annual basis on the effectiveness of this policy;**
  - **taking into serious consideration any complaints regarding equal opportunity issues from parents, staff or pupils;**

- **monitoring the school behaviour and exclusions policy, so those pupils from minority groups are not unfairly treated.**
